

Robert Graham Huntington, Jr - Obituary



Robert Graham Huntington, Jr. (1.3.6.2.9.2.1.4.1.2.1) of Chatham, NJ and Edgartown, MA died peacefully on February 12, 2015 after a short illness. He was born to Alice Booth Huntington and Robert Graham Huntington, Sr. on January 29 1926 in Irvington, NJ. He grew up in Maplewood.

He graduated early from Columbia High School in the winter of 1944, in order to join the prestigious Navy V12 program, receiving his commission as an ensign and ultimately achieving the rank of lieutenant. He served in the Navy at Guantanamo Bay and on board various ships including the USS Wasp and the USS Toledo, of which he was a plankholder. He continued his service in the Naval Reserves for nearly 20 years. He was a lifelong member of the American Legion.

Concurrent with his Naval service he continued his education, first at Dartmouth College and then at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, from which he graduated with distinction in 1950. He was a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity. It was at Penn that he met the love of his life Shirley Bailey who he married in June, 1950.

Following his marriage they moved to Reading, PA where he worked for the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania. After three years in Reading, he returned to his home state of New Jersey where he worked for many financial concerns including Fidelity Union Trust and Allstate Insurance. Ultimately, he became President of the Chatham Savings and Loan Association, opening its first office and serving as its President for 20 years. Many Chathamites purchased their homes with a mortgage and got their education with a student loan granted by Mr. Huntington.

He and Shirley raised five daughters in Chatham, having lived there for 62 years. He was a leader in many local organizations, serving as President of the Kiwanis Club, of the Jaycees, and of the Minisink Swim Club. He was Master Mason in Madison Lodge for 40 years serving as an officer for most of that time. Bob was also an active

member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church where he was an usher, a member of the vestry, a Sunday School teacher, and former Treasurer.


Bob was an avid student of history and had a lifelong interest in railroading, travelling extensively through the US, Canada, and Europe by rail. He was also fascinated by theater organs and generously volunteered in the renovation and restoration of historic organs in old theaters. He was very active in the Huntington Family Association serving for several years as its President and then Vice-President.

Bob was a longtime summer visitor to Martha's Vineyard. He first came to the Vineyard in the summer of 1962 renting a typical Victorian in Oak Bluffs. The family enjoyed many happy summers in Oak Bluffs prior to buying a home in Edgartown in 1977. His happiest days there were spent surf casting off of South Beach, having breakfasts at Farm Neck or Dockside Cafe, and just enjoying the beauty of the island.

He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Shirley Bailey Huntington, five daughters Ann Barnett, Jean (Steve) Cress, Nancy (Greg) Solomon, Robin (Mike) Ford, and Amy Huntington, six grandsons Michael (Mandy), Andrew, and Jeffrey Ford, Scott and David Cress, and Gregory Solomon, and one great granddaughter Olive, and well as many beloved nieces and nephews.

Huntington Ingalls Industries

Huntington Ingalls Industries, headquartered in Newport News, Virginia, was founded on March 31, 2011 when Northrop Grumman's Shipbuilding Sector was spun off as an independent company. On the same day, the new company, Huntington Ingalls Industries, began trading on the New York Stock Exchange under the ticker symbol HII.

The name, Huntington Ingalls Industries, honors the long-standing legacies of two shipbuilding divisions: Newport News Shipbuilding and Ingalls Shipbuilding.

In 1886, railroad magnate Collis P. Huntington (1821-1900) founded the Chesapeake Dry Dock and Construction Co., which later became Newport News Shipbuilding & Dry Dock Company. Learn more about Newport News Shipbuilding.

Robert Ingersoll Ingalls Sr. (1882-1951) built a blacksmith and forging business into Alabama's Ingalls Iron Works. In 1938, he expanded into shipbuilding and established Ingalls Shipbuilding on the East Bank of the Pascagoula River in Mississippi. In 2013, Ingalls Shipbuilding celebrated its 75 anniversary.

Since their founding, the shipyards have built more than 1,300 commercial and military ships. Recently, the Navy awarded \$6.1 billion in contracts to Huntington Ingalls Industries and General Dynamic Bath Iron Works for nine Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyers (DDG-51) to be purchased between Fiscal Years 2013 to 2017 in a massive multi-year shipbuilding deal.

The contract award has Huntington Ingalls Industries building five of the hulls for \$3.3 billion and Bath Iron Works four for \$2.8 billion. The multi-year deal — starting with future ships *Paul Ignatius* (DDG-117) and *Daniel Inouye* (DDG-118) — includes an option for a tenth DDG-51 if the Navy can overcome a sequestration funding challenge.

Huntington Ingalls Industries is the nation's largest military shipbuilder, and shipbuilding is the primary business. While they continue to build the finest ships at sea, they are also expanding into adjacent markets, including the energy industry, by leveraging their expertise in engineering, project management, site management, and heavy manufacturing and construction.
